And so we come to the climax of Holy Week, and the core focus of our faith: the great event of Easter, with its 'resurrection' symbolism. We may not have lit Easter Fire at dawn this year, but we can still sense the promise of those flames – a promise that says the warmth, vitality and light of the Risen Christ will, as in previous times, be as powerful this year as ever, despite the overshadowing of virus. Lacking the Paschal Light, we can – in the quiet of our own homes – replicate its presence by using a candle of our own, so do feel free to create your own atmosphere as you follow this liturgy through.

As you reflect upon the words, we hope that they do indeed contain 'hope'. Hope that, despite all else that is going on at the moment, Christ's intervention into our lives will bring about a dimension of strength, resolve, and determination; a dimension beyond the range of any virus; a dimension whose characteristics provide shape and form for a life well-lived, a life focussed upon good, a life centred upon the valuable teachings of his earthly ministry. Such a rich inheritance should enable us to find all hope.

This short liturgy is designed to be used in your own homes – and we hope that it will be of use to you at this time. You can share it as a family around your kitchen-table as it is perfectly shaped to include a cup of coffee and your PJs! You can sit quietly by yourself, and ponder its words. However you use it, pause and remember the rest of our Church community at this time – and look forward to a time of celebration when we will indeed be together again ...

The Easter Anthems

Christ our Passover has been sacrificed for us: so let us celebrate the feast,

<u>A Word of Scripture</u>

MATTHEW 28:1-10

After the Sabbath, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. And suddenly there was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it. His appearance was like lightning, and his clothing white as snow. For fear of him the guards shook and became like dead men. But the angel said to the women,

"Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. He is not here; for he has been raised, as he said. Come, see the place where he lay. Then go quickly and tell his disciples,

So they left the tomb quickly with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples. Suddenly Jesus met them and said,

"Greetings!"

And they came to him, took hold of his feet, and worshipped him. Then Jesus said to them, "Do not be afraid; go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me."

A Song of the New Creation

Alternatively, you may wish to reflect upon these adapted words from the "Exsultet":

Rejoice, for this is the Passover of that true Lamb of God, by whose blood the homes of all the faithful are hallowed and protected.

This is the time when of old you saved our fathers, delivering the people of Israel from their slavery, and leading them dry-shod through the sea. This is the time when Jesus Christ vanquished hell and rose triumphant from the grave.

This is the time when all who believe in him are freed from sin and restored to grace and holiness.

> Most blessed of all times, when wickedness is put to flight and sin is washed away, lost innocence regained, and mourning turned to joy.

Life truly blessed, when heaven is wedded to earth and all creation reconciled to God!

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us.
